"Now I have lost time," Juan thought. "I have to hurry to make up for lost time."

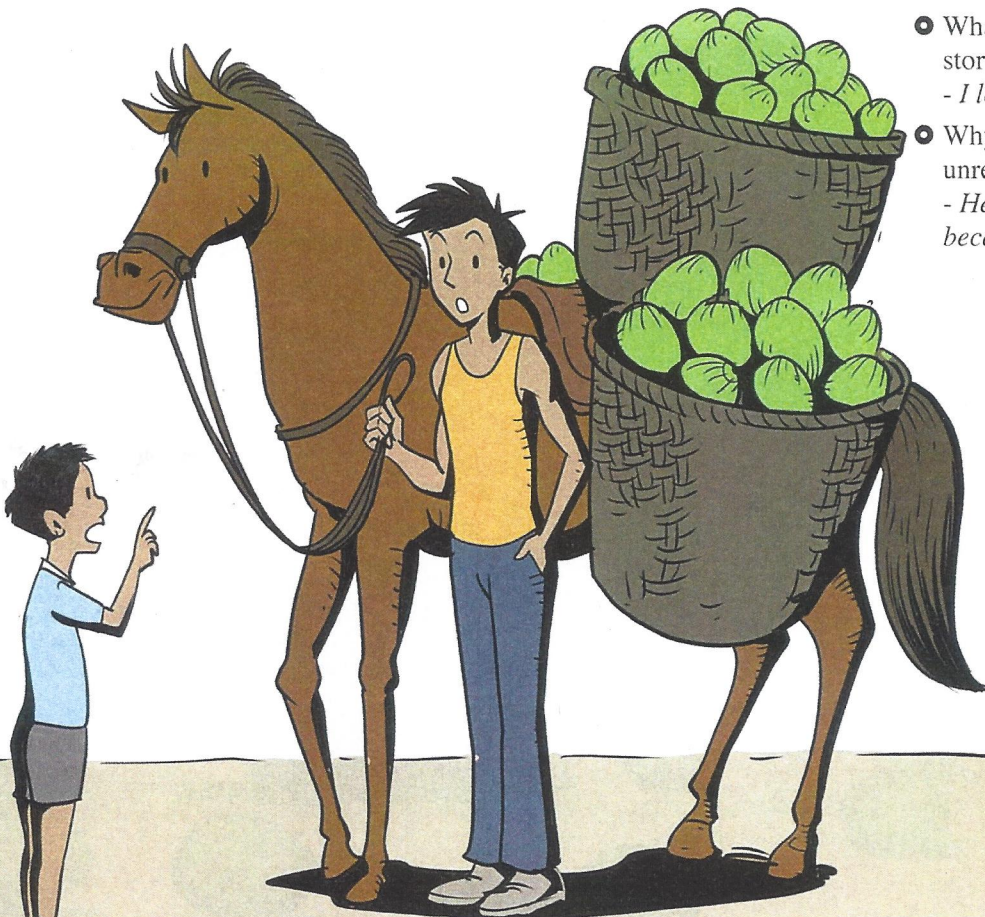
