
Usage Tip -

The fox tried to climb into the hole. But, the hare had built it well. The hare stayed warm and *snug* inside long after the fox had left. He thought pleasant thoughts about his mother and father. It had paid to listen to them when he lived at home.

The kids **dove** under their beds to hide from their older brother.

snug (adj) [snng] 感到溫暖舒適的

Evelyn made sure Max and Jack were **snug** in their beds before she left their room.
