

# The Elephants and the King of Mice

This caused problems for the mice.

Many of the mice were <u>smashed</u> while walking across the street. The elephants walked in large groups visiting with each other on the way to the

lake. Their heads were in the air as they talked to each other. They did not even see the little mice who suffered *beneath* their feet. The king of the mice knew the deaths were *accidental*, but he decided to talk to the elephants to stop more deaths.

### Usage Tip

A long time later, the elephants were caught in traps that were set by elephant hunters. They were tangled up in thick nets. No matter how they tried, they could not free themselves.


## Usage Tip •

He remembered the promise of the king of the mice. He called to one of the elephants that had not been caught. "Go to os the village by our lake. Find the king of the mice. Remind him of his promise to help us if we ever needed it."

The elephant went with great speed and told the king what had happened. The king of the mice immediately *assembled* all of the mice and said, "It is time to <u>repay</u> the elephants for listening to our <u>plea</u> to change their route. Let us hurry to their aid." The mice followed the elephant to where his leader and his friends were trapped. The mice *chewed* on the ropes that made up the nets and cut them *loose*.

Finally the elephants were set free. They thanked the mice for their help. "I was *mistaken* when I said that you were too small to help us," 20 said the leader. "I will never judge anyone again by the way they look."
